

Our Strategy:


We focus on two objectives critical to early childhood success:



Exercise: Developing Your Pitch

April – November

• Volunteers have interacted with candidates 71 times in 22 counties across the state asking the same questions over and over again







October

- Volunteers are sending messages via social media or email to state house and state senate candidates asking he or she where he or she stands on home visiting and quality early childhood education
- Volunteers are collecting signatures of voters in support of early education (like home visiting)

November – December

- Volunteers are sending messages via email to state house and state senate winners asking he or she to support quality early education like home visiting and asking how to help.
- Volunteers are collecting signatures of voters in support of early education (like home visiting) for the new governor.

January

 Volunteers will deliver petitions and coloring sheets to lawmakers during the first week of session asking them to make kids a priority


