Parent Support Network & RIFI a Perfect Gift

Parent Support Network RI (PSNRI)

- Founded in 1995 when a group of parents, family members, transition aged youth, and those with lived expertise in behavioral health, child welfare, substance use disorders, and more committed to supporting and assisting their peers.
- Works with partners within our state and nationally to empower children, youth, families and individuals using dynamic supports, education, and advocacy
- Our goal is to prevent abuse and neglect and make progress towards universal health, wellness, and recovery.

RI Fatherhood Initiative

- In 2017, a unique partnership was formed with Rhode Island Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF) to increase father engagement and improve outcomes for families
- Fathers with lived expertise now work one-on-one assisting dads who want to increase parenting skills and become more involved in their children's' lives thorough PSN Fatherhood Programming.
- Although many of these fathers are referred by DCYF we also have community and self-referrals
- Weekly Support Groups are held in person and via zoom to increase dads' protective capabilities as well as have a safe place to discuss their struggles and celebrate successes.
- Using a goal-oriented process and an empathetic approach, fathers of all stages and backgrounds can benefit.



Fathers as Protective Factors

Fathers make a unique contribution to the development and well-being of children

Fathers playing a more active role in their child's life benefits both families and communities

Having a positive relationship with their father builds social and emotional competence in children

Fathers are both role models and relational models for children by providing basic needs and supports

We can't avoid all of life's hardships, but father involvement can be a positive factor in children building the resilience needed to overcome them

Our History-Partners in Prevention

- This voluntary group ranges from teen fathers to grandfathers all coming together, sharing experiences and learning from each other. The meetings are great for dads going through divorce/separation, involved with DCYF, first time fathers, and more; all are welcome to attend.
- PSNRI and the DCYF have partnered to support fathers throughout our state using an innovating and engaging fatherhood program. This program is focuses on father's individual needs, is father run and promotes emotional wellbeing, peer supports and a safe space for fathers to talk openly about what is going on in their lives.
- Our partnership began in May of 2017 with biweekly in-person meetings and continued throughout the COVID 19 pandemic quickly transitioning to weekly virtual, and now hybrid meetings.
- We continue to be actively engaged in race equity, fathers' rights and advocacy using our threetiered approach.

Our 3-Tiered Approach

Father Partners

- Work directly with parents using both 1-on-1 and Wraparound techniques
- Referrals come from the Centralized Referral Unit (CRU) of DCYF or Statewide Opioid Response Team (SOR)

The Fatherhood Support Group

- Fathers helping fathers using a community approach
- Opportunity for fathers to speak directly on areas they would like change

Steering Committee

- State and Local Agencies coming together to improve systematic inclusion of fathers and build equity
- Employing the Strategic Community Action Plan to promote change through policy and legislative reform

Father Partners

Parents with lived expertise in overcoming similar struggles, assist fathers by working one-on-one with dads who want to be better parents and more involved in their children's' lives.

We work closely with the Rhode Island Department of Children, Youth & Families (DCYF) through their referrals to help fathers complete their service goals on the path towards reunification. Although many of these fathers are referred by DCYF we also have community and self-referrals. With a goal-oriented process and an empathetic approach, fathers of all stages and backgrounds can benefit.

Building Connections With Fathers

- We have found that the fastest, strongest connections are built upon shared experiences and commonality. Through recognition of similarities in our struggles deep bonds are formed.
- Although there are many parallels, empathy is used in acknowledging not being in another's shoes.
- The New England Fathering Conference has been instrumental in bringing fathers together to learn and connect.
- Through support group meetings, conferences, and individual work not only are fathers helped, but new father leaders emerge.

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

Pilot Learning Collaborative: Lessons Learned

Strengthening Recruitment Strategies for Fatherhood Programs

Building on five years of Texas Fatherhood Summits, the Pilot Learning Collaborative (PLC) provided an opportunity to learn more about how father-serving organizations who have attended past Summits have incorporated the recruitment lessons learned from the Summits. The PLC also provided an opportunity for providers to learn from each other and to strengther their recruitment strategies. The PLC was a valuable forum in which providers could connect with each other to learn more about what other programs are doing and to share recruitment techniques. Our key learnings through discussions with providers during the PLC sessions included identifying that:

- 1. Providers find value in connecting with each othe
- 2. Providers need practice articulating the value of the program to fathers
- 3. Providers need to create recruitment training plans for their organization
- Providers need to fully consider the impact of father voice and how they can use father testimonials to strengthen their recruitment strategies
- Providers need to create a strategic recruitment plan.
- Overall, participants had positive feedback about the PLC structure and highlighted the breakout sessions as a key way to engage with other providers. Participants expressed interest in future Learning Collaboratives and shared ways to improve the Learning Collaborative structure.
