

The Prevention Councils utilize a structured approach to build a system of support for local communities and families that live in them by:


- focusing on primary and secondary child abuse prevention strategies,
- a needs assessment which analyzes gaps,
- community input, and
- a county level advisory board representing the diversity and needs of the county (over 300 community and parent leaders)

to select approved evidence - based and informed parent education, supports, and strategies to offer in their respective counties for the upcoming year.

These targeted and individualized prevention plans focus on programs and activities that will lead to the most substantial advancements in preventing child abuse in each county.





As a part of the Maine Child Safety and Family Well-Being Plan, the Prevention Councils are convening community partners, parents, caregivers, and youth to identify existing Community Based-Spaces for families in every county and assess opportunities to enhance or expand these spaces locally.



A Community - Based Space for families must also have all of the following essential components:


- Physical Location: Physical space that is welcoming and open to the public
- Open and Accessible : Any individual can access the space
- Responsive & Flexible: Supports are reflective and responsive to the needs, cultures, and interests of families and the community.
- No Cost: Offerings are free and/or at no cost.
- Supports & Services: Offered by staff, volunteers, or partners
- Information & Referrals: Information about resources is available, and parents, caregivers, youth, and children are connected to services.
- Family Centered: A strengths based approach that values families, and recognizes them as integral to the planning and development of the community based space.

The supports and services offered at a Community
Based Space for families may include:

- Parenting/Caregiver Education
- Parent/Caregiver Peer Support Groups
- Parent/Caregiver & Child Interactive Groups or Activities
- Community Development
- Concrete Supports & Resources
- Support School Readiness and School Success
- Parent/Caregiver Voice & Leadership Opportunities
- Community/Family Events
- Connections & Collaborations

The Office of Family Voice also leads the Department's Fatherhood Engagement Committee (FEC). The FEC's goal is to create a culture that encourages fathers' participation and involvement. The FEC includes staff from DCF and sister state agencies, community stakeholders and system partners, and fathers with lived experiences from across the state.





- In 2019, we collaborated with NJ Courts to extend expungement programs to the community.
- In 2022 I was invited to Atlantic and Cape May Counties – Vicinage I, Gun Violence Reduction committee.
- In 2023, we were able to have a space called the "Fatherhood Network Room a.k.a. The Man Cave"






- In 2024, We began planning the collaboration between Gateway Community Action Partnership -Probation/Child Support Fatherhood Program.
- We commenced to engage the community and staff with several showings of the documentary "The Mask You Live In."






 We wanted to assist the non-custodial parents by hosting a session to inform them about navigating Family Court and Making Motions.





 We then created a piloted session to assist non-custodial parents to feel as prepared as possible when coming into the Family Court setting.





 Currently we find ourselves working on the creation of a Safe Haven program for non-custodial parents who may have warrants for their detainment.







Bridge Maintenance: Foster Parents

- ♦ 1. Teach parenting classes to foster parents and perspective foster parents.
- ♦ 2. Update foster parents of community resources.
- ♦ 3. Mentor newly approved foster parents through their first year of approval.





Bridge Maintenance: Foster Children

- ♦ 1. Assist with children that do not have a viable placement.
- ♦ 2. Help foster children with finding mentors.
- ♦ 3. Work with graduating senior on ACT prep.


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Bridge Maintenance: Agencies

- 1. Work with the Department of Children Services and private agencies to find and address problem areas in the system.
- 2. Work with the Department of Children Services and private agencies on policy development with the state legislation.
- 3. Work with the Department of Children Service and private agencies on community engagement efforts.
