Based on the 2020 Census, the ten states with the largest American Indian/Alaska Native populations were, in order of their population: Alaska, Oklahoma, New Mexico, South Dakota, Montana, North Dakota, Arizona, Wyoming, Oregon and Washington.³



In 2020, 1 million American Indians and Alaska Natives were under 18, which comprised 27.5% of this group compared to 18.6% of non-Hispanic whites.⁴
