What system do you want to be a part of?

One that:

- Separates Black and brown children from their families, communities and cultures by the thousands each year?
- Keeps them separated for years?
- Free them for adoption?
- Never gets them adopted?
- Never achieves permanency for them?
- Allows them "to age out" without a permanent, loving connection?

OR.....

One that:

- Centers and honors fairness, justice and cultural humility?
- Nurtures psychological well-being?
- Makes family separation the last, not first action?
- Infuses family perspectives at all levels?
- Challenges false narratives about families?
- Is held accountable for higher standards of practice and decisionmaking?
- Is driven by values. Not assumptions, biases and discrimination?

How do we achieve the latter?

- Justice-Centered-Exhaustive-Efforts
 - Becoming aware of the problem
 - Know the foundations (history) of the problem
 - Understanding your relationship to the problem (in the context of self, family and community)
 - To be clear about what you're saying YES to
 - Develop multiple options
 - Evaluate, measure and learn
 - Refuse the urge to stop before the best outcome is achieved for the family. Not the court!

Racial justice is not only a value and desired outcome, but a process of intentional action to:

IDEALISM VERSUS REALISM

- 1. <u>Eliminate</u> systemic barriers that have produced historical and contemporary inequities based on race.
- 2. <u>Focus</u> on the distribution of resources and access to opportunity to members of the groups that have experienced systemic and institutional discrimination and oppression.
- 3. <u>Create</u> new systems, policies, and practices that institutionalize equity, accountability, and authentic community/family engagement to support sustainable, transformational (*reinvention of self and system*) change.
- 4. <u>Disaggregate</u> data extracted from child and family serving systems to determine our collective progress toward race equity.
