

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THE INEQUITY WE SAW

Years of private practice and public defense work exposed dramatically different outcomes for families with wealth and privilege versus families of a lower socioeconomic backgrounds.

PREVENTION FOCUS

FIRST Clinic Mission: To prevent the unnecessary separation and infliction of trauma on newborns and their families through CPS removal by providing compassionate and effective legal representation and to connection to community supports.

- Working upstream
- Avoiding removal and/or court intervention

Long term goal — Sustainability and Replication Statewide



PARTNERING WITH MEDICAL PROVIDERS

How?

- Utilizing existing relationships and connections within the community.
- Finding partners with shared vision and shared goals.

Changing Relationships:

- Higher level of prenatal engagement prior to delivery.
- Better understanding from medical community of CPS involvement
- Increased participation and advocacy for families from medical team

Building a multidisciplinary team:

- Attorney/Parent Ally/Social Worker/Nurse/Housing Navigator/Drug and Alcohol Provider



HOW DOES THIS WORK?

- Early intervention
- Legal advice, advocacy and guidance in navigating child welfare investigation process
- Access to community supports and partners
- Educating all parties
- Connection to Parent Ally

Outcomes:

- Stop the trauma of separation
- Less State involvement
- Empowerment for families
- Community Connections
- Equity
- Cost Savings




FIRST CLINIC GROWTH: CLIENTS SERVED

FIRST CLINIC CASE OUTCOMES: DEPENDENCY FILINGS


What percent of eligible FIRST cases, with a known filing status, had dependencies filed?


WA race/ethnicity demographics of children in dependency cases were 49% white children in 2020 and 47% white children in 2021.



Mission statement: The The



The problem

Approximately 25 million children in the U.S. live in father-absent households. Fatherless children are at a higher risk of poverty, substance abuse, and criminal behavior.


Lack of father figures can lead to higher poverty rates and increased risk of negative behaviors in children.

Fathers' involvement with their children



STATS

- Research shows that a father's absence affects children in numerous unfortunate ways, while a father's presence makes a positive difference in the lives of both children and mothers.
- Teens who reported higher levels of father-adolescent warmth, communication, time together, academic expectations, and relationship satisfaction also reported significantly higher levels of self-rated general health in young adulthood.
- Teens' positive perceptions of their relationships with their mothers and fathers are associated with a wide range of favorable outcomes in young adulthood.



Children of actively engaged fathers participating in a fatherhood program show a remarkable 30% improvement in academic performance compared to those without such involvement, underscoring the transformative impact of positive fatherhood on educational outcomes."

Our fatherhood program emphasizes a holistic approach, providing workshops, mentorship opportunities, and resources tailored to develop engaged fathers. By fostering communication skills, promoting emotional intelligence, and offering practical parenting strategies, we empower fathers to actively participate in their children's lives, leading to stronger family bonds and positive long-term outcomes.


Key Reasons to Join:
